

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

ICEBERG LETTUCE STURFED WITH BLEU CHEESE

smallish head iceberg lettuce

1/2 pound bleu cheese ...

1/3 ounce cream cheese tablespoon light cream

tablespoon chives

l whole pimiento

Whipped-cream mayonnaise or French

dressing.

Hollow out the center of the head of lettuce, leaving about a one inch shell of lettuce leaves. Blend the bleu cheese and the cream together until smooth. Add the light cream and blend. Add the pimiento and chives and mix thoroughly. Stuff this filling into the hollow of the lettuce and chill in the refrigerator for an hour or two or until the cheese becomes solid. Tying the head of lettuce together will help solidify it.

At serving time cut the lettuce in crosswise slices about one inch thick and serve with French dressing or with a whipped-cream mayonnaise dressing made by blending equal parts of whipped cream and mayonnaise.

Serves 4 to 6.

HOW TO REMOVE STAINS FROM CLOTHES

PAINT - first scrape off the excess, and if you do that quickly soap and water may be all you need. If not, dilute alcohol, vaseline, turpentine or carbon tetrachloride and apply to the spot.

INK - Alcohol, javel water, turpentine, milk, French chalk, fullers earth can be applied. Also quick laundering in lukewarm water with soap can do the trick if the fabric is washable.

LIPSTICK AND ROUGE - Work vaseline or lard into the stain to loosen it, sponge with (Cont. on next col.)

HOW TO REMOVE STAINS FROM CLOTHES (Cont.) carbon tetrachloride if the fabric is non-washable. For washable fabrics use the same procedure and then wash in warm suds.

PERSPIRATION - There is nothing you can do if these stains have been left long enough to remove the color. But fresh perspiration can be removed with bleach, ammonia water, vinegar, bleaching in the sun and peroxide.

ALCOHOL - Just sponge the fabric lightly

with cold water.

COFFEE AND TEA - For washable fabrics pour boiling water on the stain, but for nonwashable fabrics apply glycerine, let stand for an hour, then sponge with water.

GRAVY - With washable fabrics, soak in cold water, then wash with soap and water Sponge stains with cool water on non-washable fabrics.
