## ONTARIO LEGISLATORS VISIT TERRACE BAY

Terrace Bay was honoured on Tuesday, August 10th, by a visit from a group of Members of the Ontario Legislature who are touring Northwestern Ontario. Two Ministers accompanied the party, the Honourable Clare Mapledoram, Minister of Lands and Forests and the Honourable Phillip T. Kelly, Minister of Mines. Mr. Fred Donegan, General Superintendent of the C.P.R. accompanied the party.

After a trip through the town with a stop at the new Recreation building which is nearing completion, the party was entertained at breakfast by the LongLac Pulp and Paper Company Limited at Hotel Terrace. The Management and Superintendents of the Company had breakfast with the visitors at which time many acquaintances were renewed and much information exchanged.

After breakfast, Mr. D. C. Porter, Mill Manager, welcomed the visitors and told of the growth of the community, particularly since the last visit of the members. He then introduced Mr. F. S. Seaborne, Vice-President in Charge of Manufacturing of the Kimberly-Clark Corporation. He brought greetings from Mr. Charles Sage who regretted that he was unable to be present.

Mr. Seaborne stated that the primary advantage of manufacturing pulp in Terrace Bay was that of quality. No finer pulp can be produced than that from Northern Spruce and Jackpine. On the other hand there are distinct economic disadvantages as compared with manufacturing in the

Southern States. The quick growing Southern Pine gives the Southern manufacturers less costly pulpwood. Because of climatic conditions, capital expenditure for the buildings required for a mill are much less. Costs of coal and chemicals are higher here and the long hauls to the market make for high freight bills.

Mr. Mapledoram spoke briefly stating that the Government recognizes the problems in the matters referred to by Mr. Seaborne. Consideration will have to be given not only so that present manufacturers but new Companies will find it desirable to engage in the great Pulp and Paper Industry in this part of the Province.

Mr. William Murdock thanked the LongLac Pulp and Paper Company Limited on behalf of the visitors.

The party left at 10:30 a.m. by bus for Rossport.

The Tour Committee consisted of the Honourable Clare Mapledoram, F. A. MacDougall, Deputy Minister of Lands and Forests, P. O. Rhynas, Chief of the Division of Operation and Personnel and other members of the staff of the Department of Lands and Forests.
