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NORTHWESTERN BRANCH, ONTARIO PULP AND PAPER MAKERS' SAFETY ASSOCIATION

George C. Wardrope, M.L.A. will be the principle speaker at the Annual Meeting of the pulp and paper industry's area safety organization. Sessions will be held at the Royal Edward Hotel, Fort William, Thursday, Sept. 23rd. An executive meeting of the organization is scheduled for the next day.

The Annual Meeting will mark the 18th time member mills have congregated since the Northwestern Branch was organized in 1948. The parent organization, Ontario Pulp and Paper Makers' Safety Association has its headquarters in Toronto. Included in the Northwestern Branch are all pulp and paper mills in Northwestern Ontario from Marathon to the Manitoba border.

Sessions of the Annual Meeting will be conducted throughout the day and will include committee reports, "Idea Clinic", "Report on Safety Code" by A.E. Minor of Kenora and a safety film "It Doesn't Need to Happen". At the afternoon session officers will be elected for the 1955 term.

Mr. Wardrope is scheduled to speak at the evening banquet session. Presiding at the sessions will be the Branch Chairman, E.R. Marston, Marathon Paper Mills, Marathon.

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FIRE PREVENTION NEWS

One in every five fire victims is a child under five. What can you do to protect your child from fire?

Plenty, says Fire Chief Maitland and he has this Fire Prevention Week advice for parents:

"Never leave children home alone. They're helpless to escape fire that they themselves often start when left untended.

"By the same token, always keep matches and lighters far out of the reach of youngsters."

According to the records of the National Fire Protection Association, these are two of the major causes of child fire deaths, the chief says.

"Watch out for situations where the child's clothing might catch on fire," he also warns.

"In the home, that means not being allowed to play near stoves and furnaces. Outdoors, be wary of bonfires and field fires for this reason.

"For the child's sake, be sure his party costumes and decorations are flame-proofed. And no candles, ever; give them a flashlight or electric candle instead for Halloween and other occasions.

"Play it double safe," Chief Maitland urges. "Teach your child to do the right thing if his clothes should ever catch on fire; tell him not to run, but to lie down at once and roll over slowly to smother the flames -- in a rug, blanket or coat if available."

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
