FIRE PREVENTION NEWSCarelessness Makes Fires

This year, as in other years, a number of costly fires will be traced to smoker's carelessness. Authorities have estimated that almost half the fires occurring in any year are caused by some smoker's neglect. In the home, office, factory, bush, too many fires caused by unquenched cigarets continue to take a heavy toll of life, limb and property.

But carelessness as a cause of fires is not restricted to tobacco smokers. Analysis of the causes of all fires in Canada has shown that most of the 20,000 or more fires which occur every year might have been prevented by some simple, thoughtful precaution. According to the dominion fire commissioner, the leading

causes of fires in this country are:

1. Smokers' carelessness.
2. Stoves, furnaces, and other heating equipment.
3. Electrical causes
4. Matches
5. Defective chimneys
6. Hot ashes, hot coals, open fires.
7. Petroleum products
8. Lights other than electric
9. Sparks on roof.
10. Spontaneous ignition
11. Incendiarism

It should be noted that last on the list is deliberate human intention to cause fires, either for gain or because of mental illness. All others involve human carelessness in some form and degree. The fact is, thousands of grief-spreading and costly fires all over the country could be prevented if householders took the precaution in time to maintain in good order all heating, cooking and lighting equipment; to clean out rags, paper and rubble from cupboards and cellars; to be careful when using cleaning fluids and other flammable materials; to keep matches out of children's reach and to make sure that each cigaret is out before discarding it.
