It borrowed \$12,000 from the Credit Union at a lower rate than the grain commission company would have charged. And all of the interest money stayed in the community not just the differential.

The Credit Union loaned the oil company enough to buy a carload of twine. This saved the members about \$1.00 per 100 lbs or approximately \$3,000.

The Credit Union loaned \$4,000 to the oil company to buy out the local hardware store.

<u>CREDIT UNION COLUMN</u> <u>Submitted by the Credit Union Secretary</u> The great service a credit union can render among members is well shown by the credit union operated by the cooperative-minded people of Flasher, North Dakota - The Flasher Community Credit Union. Here is part of the story, taken from an article by Orrin Shipe in the Bridge, the international magazine published by the Credit Union National Association.

It loaned the store about \$7,000 to finance stock, buildings and locker plant.

A member wished \$1,500 to finance a sheep deal. A bank refused the loan. The Credit Union granted the loan. He paid the loan in full from the sale of lambs and still has his older stock.

A members credit union loan saved him \$94 on a purchase of a combine; another \$75 on a tractor deal. Many more cases could be cited of the effect the Flasher Community Credit Union has had on the brightening of the lives of its members.

How the Credit Union has helped the Towns Business

The credit Union has loaned money to local merchants to buy stock. When the oil station closed its fiscal year on April 30th, it had outstanding only \$150.00 of accounts receivable. The Credit Union loans money to its customers, thus keeping the station on a cash basis and effecting many economies for it.

In 1940 private haulers practically left the town flat. The Farmers Union Trucking Association was formed. The Credit Union loaned \$2,200 for the first truck and permit. Later other trucks and equipment was financed. Although only about \$1,000 in dividends had been returned, other benefits have been great. To date, about 1-1/2 million dollars worth of livestock has been hauled out and on the back haul thousands of dollars worth of merchandise and much needed farm machinery. Last year the floods washed out the railroad tracks. The elevator had about 50,000 bushels of grain it (Cont. on next col.)
