RECIPE OF THE WEEK PECAN POUND CAKE

- 1 cup shortening
- 1-1/2 cups sugar
- 2 tbs. milk
- 5 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp. mace
- 1 tsp. salt
- 3/4 cup broken pecan nut meats
- 2 tsp. lemon juice
- 1 tsp. grated lemon rind

Cream together shortening and sugar; add milk. Mix well. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating after each. Sift together flour, mace and salt; add to creamed mixture. Toast nut meats; add 1/2 cup to batter. Add lemon juice and rind. Pour into greased 9" tube pan; sprinkle with remaining nut meats. Bake in moderate oven (325°F.) 1 hour 25 min. Cool 5 min. Remove cake from pan; cool on wire rack.
