If we wish to change the hockey then I would suggest that any opinions held should be directed to the C.A.H.A. not to any local hockey player who is playing the game as "writ".

Despite the rough time the boys had on the ice, the trip to Kap was a great success. For the return trip the four cars left together and kept in contact with each other from town to town.
