

FIRE PREVENTION NEWS

Fire Chief Geo. C. Maitland asks, "Do your youngsters know what a blasting cap looks like?" Maybe you had better tell them. You might save an eye, a hand, or even a life. Blasting caps, the chief says, are small metal cylinders about one quarter of an inch in diameter and range from one to five inches in length. They are loaded with a powerful and sensitive explosive charge. There are two types. One has an open end and is fired by flame from a fuse. It is often mistaken for an empty .22 cartridge. The other type has two wires extending from one end and is fired by electrical current. It could be mistaken for a firecracker or a pencil holder. Either type, if struck with a hammer or rock or placed in a flame, can kill or injure anyone standing within 200 feet.

The caps are necessary to set off dynamite for mining... building dams and bridges... opening roadways... clearing forests... and doing many other important jobs in agriculture and industry. But sometimes they are carelessly stored, lost or stolen. Children find them, play with them. Explosions frequently occur.

As a result, last year, according to the Institute of Makers of Explosives scores of children were victims of blasting cap mishaps.

Blasting caps should never even be touched by children, Chief Maitland warns. Children and inexperienced adults coming upon a cap should let it remain where it is and report the find immediately to the chief or one of his men.
