

RECIPE OF THE WEEK
HOT CROSS BUNS

cakes fresh or 2 packages granular yeast

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1/3 cup sugar

2/3 cup milk, scalded
3-1/2 cups enriched flour
1/2 cup melted shortening

3/4 teaspoon salt

3 eggs

2/3 cup currants 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

Soften yeast and dissolve sugar in milk cooled to lukewarm. Add l cup flour and beat. Add shortening, salt, eggs, and remaining flour. Beat until light about 3 minutes. Cover and let rise till double, about 1 hour. Add currants and cinnamon and mix well. Roll 1/2 inch thick on lightly floured surface. Cut rounds with 2-1/2 inch cutter. Shape into buns. Place on greased baking sheet. Cover and let rise till double. Cut cross in each bun with scissors. Brush with slightly beaten egg white. Bake in moderate oven (350°) 12 to 15 minutes. To the remaining egg white add confectioners! sugar (about 3/4 cup) to make a frosting. With a pastry tube make a cross on each bun. Makes about 2 dozen. Lowes. This camp is for your chillmen,
