THE ANGEL IN THE CORNER Monica Dickens

Virginia is the ambitious young daughter of divorced parents. She lives with her cynical and sophisticated mother in London. To escape the domination of her mother, Virginia abandons her career and impulsively marries the attractive, but shiftless Joe Colonna. Through the poverty and tragedy that follows, she steadfastly clings to her childhood belief that her angel stands in the corner to guard and guide her.

TWILIGHT FOR THE GODS Ernest Gann

This novel written by the author of The High and The Mighty, is a powerful story of sailing men and the sea. David Bell, owner and captain of the Cannibal, one of the last commercial sailing vessels afloat, knew before leaving the port of Suva, that his ship was badly in need of repairs. Nevertheless, he set sail for Mexico manned by a small crew and a handful of passengers. The author, a master in the art of creating characters so lifelike they become real persons to his readers, has written a story of a tempestuous voyage involving heroism and disaster.

WINTER FIRES

The fire which swept through the large garage in Schreiber over the weekend should serve as a reminder to many of us that we cannot be too cautious in dealing with this destructive force.

Strong winds and low temperatures hamper firemen in their battle against fire. Promptly reporting a fire is a great help to the Fire Department at all times. Constant care in dealing with furnaces and electrical wiring is a must to prevent fires. We cannot get along with cluttered up premises which hamper our escape and restrict the work of the firemen. We become so accustomed to our own heating arrangements that we seldom take preventive measures with respect to chimnies and furnaces. The colder it becomes the more we pile on the fuel, thereby broadening the prospect of danger. Always be sure we can get out of the house by the two doors, back, front or side. We should never rely on only one door to get out of in case of fire or the firemen to get into the house. Snow should be removed from the doors so the Fire
