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RECIPE OF THE WEEK

LOBSTER NEWBURG

- 2 tbsps. butter
- 1 tbsps. flour
- 2 cups cream
- 2 cups lobster meat, cooked and cubed
- 3 egg yolks, well beaten
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 tsp. salt

Melt butter in saucepan, add flour and stir until smooth. Gradually add cream and stir until blended. Bring mixture slowly to boiling point. Let simmer gently, stirring constantly until mixture thickens (about 1 min.). Add lobster meat. Bring to boiling point again. Beat egg yolks. Add a little of the hot mixture to egg, then stir into lobster sauce. Add pepper and salt. Pour into patty shells and brown under broiler.
