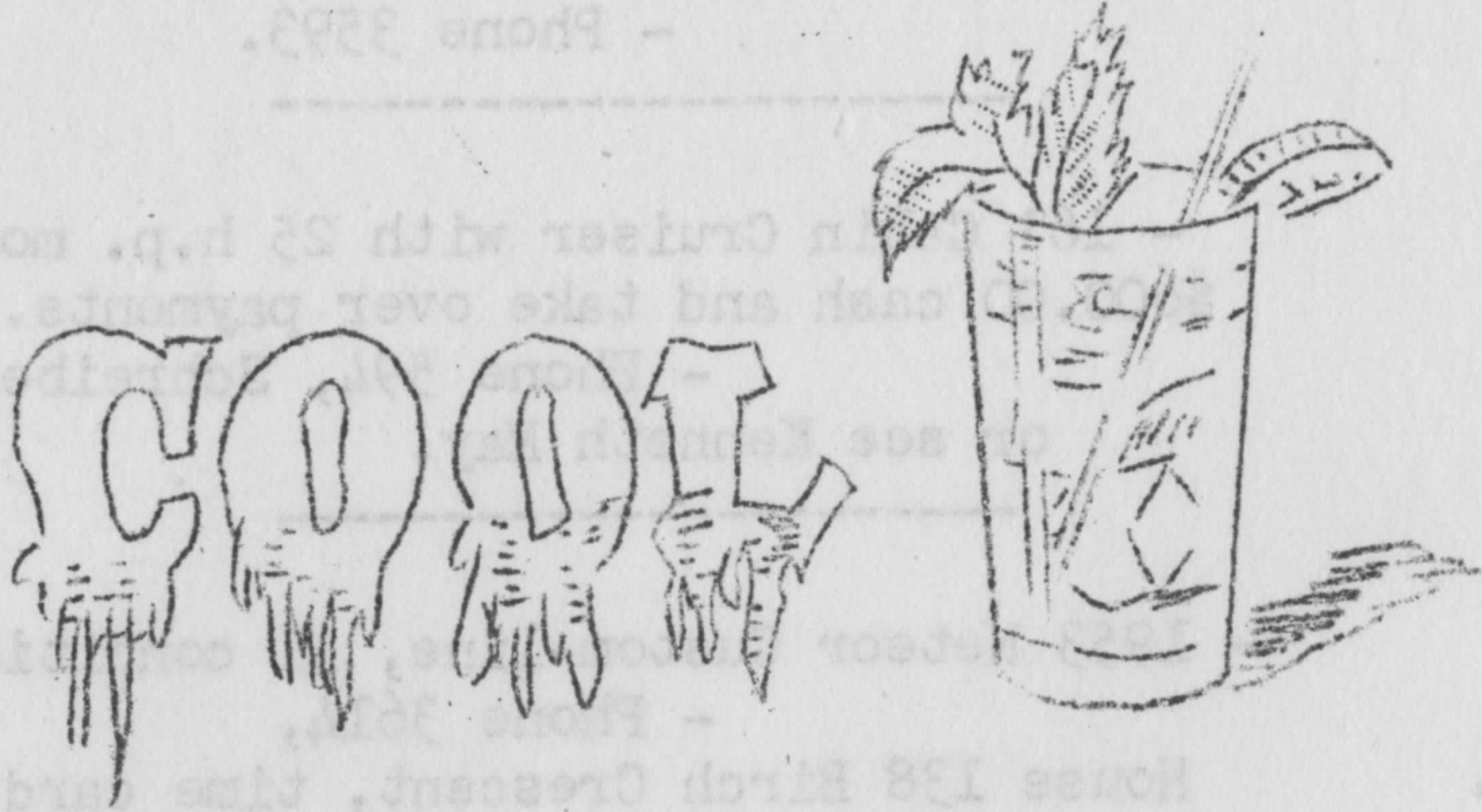
Mr. Lorne Caldwell was groomsman for his brother, and Mr. Bob Weaver was usher.

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A SUMMER DRINK IS AS COOL AS IT LOOKS

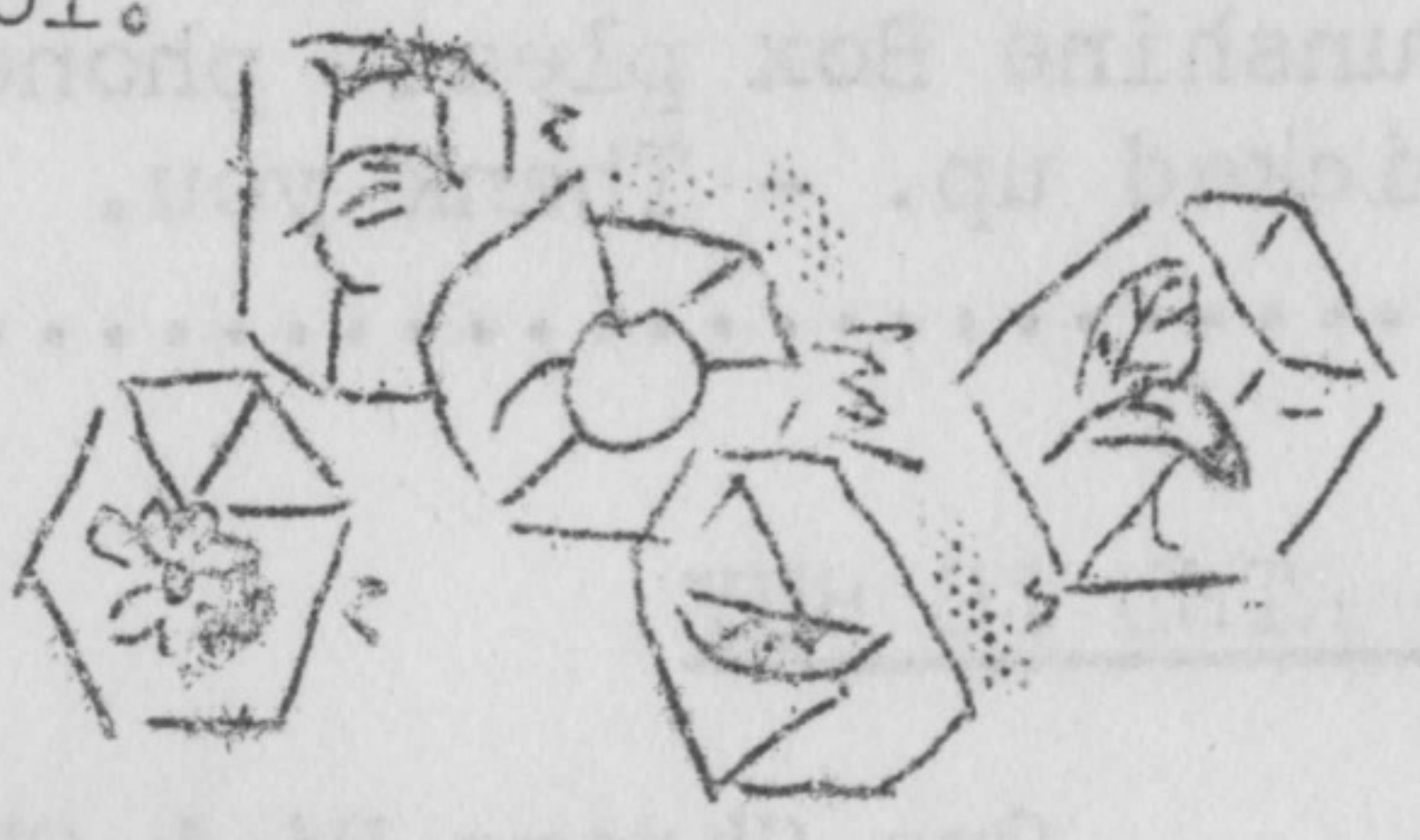
Psychologically speaking, the eyes have it -- you're only as cool as what you're looking at. The pale, icy drink -- tastes that much cooler if it looks that way. Here are some ways to create cool effects:

A long wedge of cucumber makes a fine stir. Don't peel it -- the green skin looks cool, adds stirring power.
