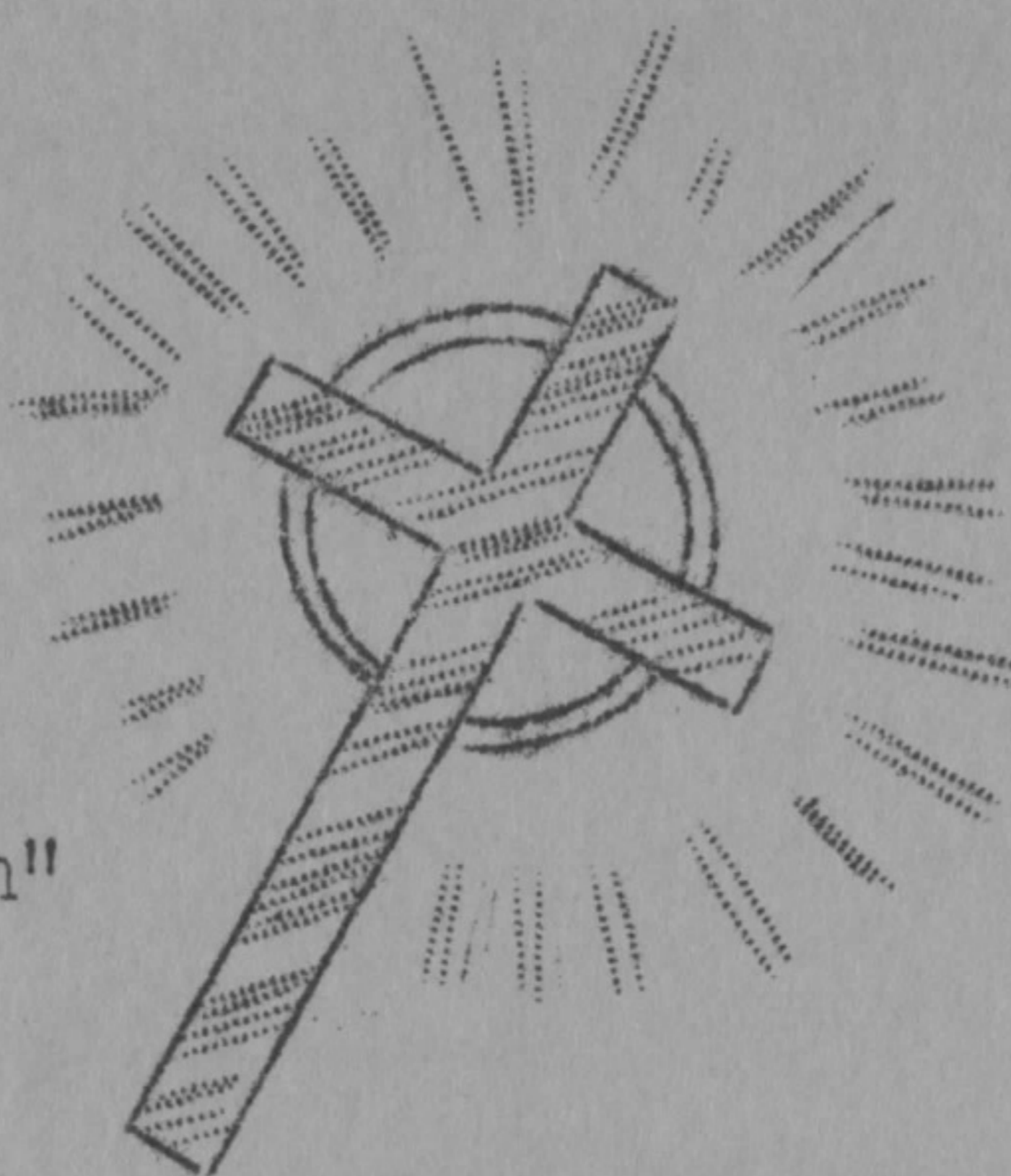

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CENOTAPH MEMORIAL

"This monument was erected by the citizens of Terrace Bay". These opening words are to be inscribed on the bronze plaque for the Cenotaph and on Saturday morning last this statement became a proven fact.

As many as 19 men turned out for the work party which in short order placed the foundation for our Memorial in place. Every branch of the Armed Forces was adequately represented and in addition a goodly number of non-veterans pitched in to get the job done.

Jack Wellings as Straw Boss and Al Harrison on blueprints set the wheels in motion and the following were on the business end of shovels and wheelbarrows: Wilf Corrigan, Jack Anderson, Chuck Haviland, Nels Allen, Eldon Marostica, Clarence Mercier, Steve Fedorick, Clarence Rousseau, Bill Kujbida, Roger Beaulieu, Pete Caron, Jim Clancy, and Jim Beddard. As late as 12 midnite Bruce Larsen and Bill Baillie were putting the finishing touches to the cement. Ed Brady held the water hose while Harold McKechnie did a fine job of cleaning up "leftovers."

Equipment for the job was amply provided by LongLac Pulp & Paper, with the cement being donated in large part by Paul Boudreau.

Next on the list of jobs is the actual erection of the Cenotaph. Request for this phase of the project is going forward to Alf Barbini and as soon as necessary arrangements can be completed, this too will be done. Dedication Ceremonies are even now being planned and although
