MALCOLM SPIDELL PRESENTED WITH GIFT

On Tuesday night at a meeting of Kimberly-Clark supervisors Malcolm Spidell was honoured on his retirement from the job as "boss" of Camp 2.

Monty Paget presented Malcolm with a Canada Savings Bond on behalf of Malcolm's many, many friends in Terrace Bay. Monty emphasized that the Bond as a farewell gift came from the office and mill employees and was indicative of the esteem which Terrace Bay people had for Malcolm.

It was pointed out that Malcolm was one of the few real pioneers of Terrace Bay. He was here before the Kimberly-Clark Company moved into the area.

Malcolm first set up camp here in 1944 on the 'flats' south of the highway on the far side of the bridge on the Aguasabon River where a remmant of the original bush road leads down to the falls. At that time he was driving logs for the Pulpwood Supply Company who also operated a camp at the upper rapids, $4\frac{1}{2}$ hours by cance from the 'flats' camp. When Kimberly-Clark obtained the limits and became the LongLac Pulp & Faper Company, Malcolm in the winter of 1945-46 with his 18-man camp swelled by the influx of engineers, construction workers, etc., started work on the first building in the South Camp.

Malcolm's impression on Terrace Bay will be left with us for a long time, perhaps forever. Camp 2 will be known as Malcolm's camp for some time to come - and Spidell's road to the camp is like a trade mark.
