HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY NEWS

In the early ages it was believed that in plant products had been provided remedies for all diseases. The resemblance of any part of a certain plant to an organ of the body was regarded as nature's way of indicating that the plant would cure diseases of that organ. For example, a plant with a heart shaped leaf should be the source of the remedy administered for heart disease. As the leaf of the common hepatica was supposed to resemble the liver, it was prescribed for diseases thought to originate in that organ. It is interesting to note that the hepatica still retains its common name of liver-leaf.

This method of selecting the proper medicinal plant has, of course, been long discontinued, but a large number of plant products are still used in the practice of medicine. Among these products are quinine

and belladonna, and also podophyllin, which is obtained from the rootstock of our common May apple. So many of such remedies are known at present that they have come to form an important branch of medical science.
