2 pounds fish steaks (salmon, haddock etc.) Salt, pepper l egg, slightly beaten 1 tablespoon water Fine dry bread crumbs or flour

Makes 4 servings. Note: Fish can be fried in hot deep fat (375°, on frying thermometer). Fry 3 to 5 minutes, or until
