We are not faring very well with the Dept. of Highways on subsidies for the street paving program for this year. Indications are that we have had about all the money in subsidies that we will get for street paving, in that the remaining streets are strictly residential. They can not be classed as through streets or as commercial streets. The program for the summer, therefore, looks like either getting only two streets paved, or doing curbing over a much larger area, and then doing the paving next year.

An agreement has been signed for an instrument mechanic to keep the heating controls in both the Public School and High School in good working condition throughout the coming year. This work will also include bringing certain pieces of the control equipment into good working condition during the summer months of this year, so that we will be prepared to start the season with the system in good condition.
