SCHREIBER COUNCIL - Cont'd from page 3 A library grant of \$1050 and rent of \$700 was set. Reeve's salary was again set at \$250 per annum and councillors at \$150. Standing committees were named for Property, Roads, Water, Fire and Police and a Building Inspector and Ratepayers' representative to the rink board appointed. The Reeve outlined the various duties contingent on these appointsments. Rent for water works department was set and water works and general accounts ordered paid. The assessment roll for 1959 was accepted.

It is again necessary to ask for volunteer drivers for the ambulance and tenders will be asked for snow removal equipment.

Consideration and discussion was held on possibility of surfacing both ice arena and former tennis courts. Ambulance rates and equipment were considered and again, the cesspool pumping, with no decision made.
