N.S.H.L. TO ENFORCE STRICT APPLICATION OF RULES

At a meeting of the N.S.H.L. Governors in Terrace Bay on Sunday, January 18th, J. Tookenay of Superiors was suspended for six games as a result of last Thursday's game in Terrace Bay. Seagris of Red Rock Royals also received a three-game suspension.

As a result of these suspensions the Board of Governors have instructed the Referee-in-Chief to have the league officials tighten up on the officiating.

Hockey fans generally will be in agreement with this action. By strict adherence to the rules the result should be better hockey from the spectators viewpoint and, more important, less chance for injuries to the players.

Hard luck has dogged the Superiors this past month. Bill Pytyck, Ray Stachiw are out with hand injuries; Ted Wainikka is out of uniform for medical reasons and Joe Tookenay benched for six games due to the decision of the Governing body of the North Short League.

Last Thursday, what looked like a sure win against the Marathon Mercs turned into a fiasco in the third period with Mercuries coming from behind by three goals to count five and grab a 6-4 victory. The blunders by Superiors were expensive as Mercs capitalized. The Sups were as stunned by the turn of the game as the spectators.

On Saturday they redeemed themselves somewhat when they eked out a 5-4 victory against Nipigon Flyers. Sunday, however, saw them trailing 8-4 against the same team. That is the last time Superiors will meet the Flyers on Nipigon ice. The remaining contests will see Nipigon here. So far the board shows two wins for Sups out of six starts.

Thursday, Jan. 22nd, at the Arena, Superiors will meet Nipigon and on Sunday, Jan. 25th they will come up against the Red Rock Royals. On Tuesday, Jan. 27th Nipigon will again visit the Terrace Arena with Marathon coming for another fray Thursday, January 29th. These games should all provide interesting entertainment.

Because we want to pay our way and not accept free transportation when we travel, we have a scale of rates for each of the schools to which we travel. For example, if the Hockey team travels to Marathon; we pay the drivers of four cars \$3.00 each. In addition to travelling expenses, which accounts for the greater percentage of our Budget, we try to make our June Prom the finest dance of the year.
