AS YOU KNOW, the Ontario Society for Crippled children extends a helping hand to every handicapped youngster in our Province. Through your generous donations in past Easter-Seal campaigns you have helped the Society to provide medical attention and advice, nursing care, corrective braces and wheel chairs, summer camping, financial assistance and a host of other special services. And yet despite all this much more is needed for crippled children in Ontario. Hospital and treatment centres are overcrowded or completely lacking in many areas. There are no special facilities in the Province for rare and difficult cases requiring long-term residential care. It is to solve these and many other problems that you are now being asked to help build the new Ontario Crippled Children's Centre.

THE NEW CENTRE will be located near Sunnybrook Hospital in North York Township. Crippled Children from all over Ontario will be referred here for diagnosis and treatment. The facilities will include swimming and hydrotherapy pools, physical, occupational and speech therapy services, nurseries and academic classrooms, 105 beds for in-patients and services for 300 out-patients a day. \$4,088,490 is needed to carry out this humanitarian project. Our objective is \$1,200 so little to ask to strengthen their muscles and limbs; to give them the courage and the help they must have to succeed.
