Information has been received that the Municipal Board of Ontario have approved the By-Law which will change the status of Terrace Bay from an Improvement District to an elected town council form of local government.

It is expected that this change will be effective about July 1st this year so that an election is probable for the end of June.

FORT FRANCES 4 MARATHON 1 IN FINAL GAME OF THUNDER BAY PLAYOFFS.

The Fort Frances Canadians won the Thunder Bay Intermediate Championship on Thursday night, March 26th, in Terrace Bay. In the five-game series Fort Frances won three games, Marathon won one and one game was tied.

Marathon Mercuries gave a good account of themselves and demonstrated the calibre of North Shore hockey, particularly on their home ice. The Fort Frances Club was highly rated but on the games played here it was their goal tender who kept them in the game, displaying sensational net minding. In three games played here Marathon won 5 to 3, one game tied, final game 4 to 1 for Fort Frances. The final game was a tie game going into the third period. Deluca in the Marathon nets was hurt. Jorgenson took his place and, although he played good goal he had not seen action for five or six weeks. Fort Frances got the tie-breaker midway through the third period and then won going away to end a good final series.
