## INTEREST MOUNTS IN LOCAL ELECTIONS

Nomination Day for the local Council is just three weeks away. June 10th is THE DAY. Interest in the nominations and the election is becoming very keen, and rightly so, as the first elected Council is of vital interest to all residents.

In order to qualify as a candidate a resident must be nominated by two qualified electors who must appear at the local Municipal Office between 7 and 8 P.M. on June 10th.

An amendment has been made to the Election Act which provides that an Assessed Householder and the wife of an assessed Householder may stand for office if qualified. Previously the Act stated that the assessed tenant only was eligible. This amendment will apply also to appointment to the High School Board.
