KIWANIS CLUB PROGRAMME CENTRED AROUND T. B. CAMPAIGN

Among the most interesting of the Kiwanis Club's weekly programmes presented so far this year was the one handled by Mr. C. E. (Monty) Paget on Tuesday, August 11th. Organized in the form of a quiz, members were tested on their general knowledge of the present fight to wipe out Tuberculosis in Canada. Dr. John Whiteside, drawing upon his experience and training in the field of Public Health enlarged upon some of the information and urged that Kiwanis Club members get into the drive that is moving toward the eventual elimination of a needless disease in this country.

Each year about 3,000 people in Ontario enter sanitoria for average periods of twelve months. Doctors and scientists, working hand in hand, have reduced the death rate although there is no marked reduction as yet in the number of cases in the province.

The warning was sounded that, in its initial stages, there were no symptoms, but due to the use of modern drugs, even moderately advanced cases now had good hope of eventual cure.

Every day 100 people in Ontario become infected with Tuberculosis but skin tests and X-rays are rapidly diagnosing them and early cures are the rule.

The campaign to stamp out Tuberculosis is now on. Tuberculosis still is the biggest killer, except for influenza, among all contagious diseases. Science has it on the run but it is up to the general public to do its part. You are urged to attend the forthcoming T.B. Clinic in Terrace Bay. Help the Kiwanis Club get 100% coverage in our Town!

COUNCIL QUOTES

The Reeve, three council members and clerical staff met last Wednesday August 12th.

Current correspondence dealt with included a letter from the C.P.R. stating that shacks Council felt were unsightly, are temporary structure slated for removal at a future date.

Surveying on the extension to join Superior and Lakeview was reported on. Dr. M.A. McCausland will remain as M.O.H. under the new Township status. Dr. McCausland's report indicated that the general health of residents in Terrace Bay is good. Negotiations with the O.P.P. under an increased contract were ratified by By-Law. A progress report on the nearly completed public school Principal's home was heard and a vote taken on length of term for High School Board members resulted in P.Gombola's appointment being designated as running until December 1960 (a one-year term); H. Hall - two-year term and J. Wade to act for three years.

Councillor B. Bouchard commented on a letter received from J. Wade outlining the regular inspection of swimming pool and sewage disposal plant. A close check in the swimming area shows a consistently clean condition. The sewage disposal system, while adequate at the present time, is a problem which will have to be faced in future years.

Dogs running at large merited considerable discussion and determined steps to eradicate the nuisance will be taken next Spring. A bid by a local resident to pick-up and dispost of garbage was not accepted.

Council discussed the proposed oiling of Pine Crescent. It was felt that this is a propitious time to do as much paving as possible while the Contractor has the equipment in the vicinity. Comparable costs were discussed and the maintenance required on oiled roads against that needed on pavement was a deciding factor in the agreement to pave instead of oil.

Hacquoil Construction Company will start work on this year's paving program in Terrace Bay around September 1st and the entire project will be completed within a five or six day period.
