TELEPHONE ALERTING SYSTEM PASSES FIRST TEST

At 3.15 Sunday morning the Fire Department had their first actual alarm on the new Telephone Alerting System.

The call was due to a sprinkler failure in the L & L Store. The system worked well--thirteen out of fifteen men reported at the site within five to ten minutes.

WILLIAM T. SMITH DIES SUDDENLY

The sudden passing of William T. Smith Sunday morning at his home came as a gret shock to his friends and co-workers in Terrace Bay.

Aged sixty-two, Mr. Smith had been born in Manitoba, working for fourteen years as Labour Foreman with Carter Hall in Winnipeg prior to coming to Terrace Bay in 1946, where he again assumed the same position for Kimberly-Clark Corporation. A quiet man by nature, though fond of hunting and fishing, Mr. Smith had the respect of all who knew him. Mr. Smith was one of the pioneers of Terrace Bay having come to the district while the town and mill was still in the blueprint stage. He was a member of Local 665, I.B.P. S.P.M.W.

He leaves to mourn his passing his wife, the former Ann Lumley, whom he married in 1945, and four brothers, Paul in Vancouver, Harry in Winnipeg, Lawrence and Phillip in West Selkirk, Manitoba.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at two o'clock by the Rev. Dr. Arthur Lavender in the Terrace Bay Community Church. "Unto the Hills Do I Lift Up Mine Eyes" was the hymn chosen followed by scriptures and Prayers. In his message to the family Dr. Lavender spoke of the mysteries of life and death which, despite the great scientific discoveries, have never been penetrated. "Mr. Smith enjoyed the confidence of his employer and, speaking as a neighbour, Dr. Lavender continued, he was a good husband, a good friend, a good worker and a good neighbour". He ended his remarks with a

quotation from Whittier "Yet Love will dream, and faith will trust..... Somehow, somewhere, meet we must."

Pallbearers were: Messrs. H.P. Ratchford, W. Kujbida, D. Laporte, L. McBride, N. Chopty and A. Gobeil.

The body will be forwarded to West Selkirk, Manitoba where burial has tentatively been set for Wednesday. Prior to services on Monday the body had rested at Gawley's Funeral Home, Schreiber.
