gramme was inaugurated in the fall of 1957 and, to December 1, has trained 4,746 men and women in safe gun handling.

Announcing receipt of the hunter safety award, Ontario Lands and Forests Minister, the Hon. J.W. Spooner pointed out that persons appointed by the Department as instructors in the training programme, numbering about 2,400 are now covered by a liability insurance policy effective anywhere in Ontario, insuring the Department and the instructor during an actual course of instruction.

It was on account of the number of accidents occurring each year in the hunting field that the Department sponsored the hunter safety training programme with the co-operation of members of hunting, fishing and conservation clubs and other organizations across the province.

The programme is directed particularly to the young and it is encouraging to note that the average age of those taking the training is 15 to 16. Those who pass the course receive certificates of competence which permit them to purchase their first hunting license when they reach 16. Some taking the training are in their sixties. Old-time hunters come back to review safety factors as well as to experience the programme being presented for their children.

Ontario was selected as the leader over 26 States in the U.S.A. It is the first time that a Canadian Province has been selected for this honour. The selection committee based its comparative study of progress over the year on student training, hunting accident statistics, research, related programmes and public relations.

An interim 11-month report for Ontario shows 64 hunting accidents, including 12 fatalities this year. The average for the preceding five years has been 70 accidents annually in the hunting field of which 21 were fatal.
