COUNCIL QUOTES

Reeve J.A. Ferrier, Councillors Evans-Smith, Duncan, Heenan and Bouchard together with Sec'ty/Treas. Strutt and Clerk Hanley were present at the January 27th council meeting.

Minutes of the last regular and a special meeting were adopted as read.

Correspondence read included the annual report of the Fire Department prepared by Fire Chief Geo. Maitland; a further communication regarding proposed trailer site; one regarding traffic signs and a letter sent by council regarding sidewalks abutting to Highway 17 parallel to the Hotel and the Recreation Centre. This letter is further to council efforts to advance pedestrian safety on the highway.

A discussion developed on proposed by-law covering parking and erection of signs on Town streets.

Council rescinded a motion on the statutes regarding Recreation Centre hours after deciding that the Recreation Committee should have full responsibility in such matters.

The following letter was received recently from the Office of the Fire Marshal, Toronto, Ontario:

Terrace Bay was awarded Honorable Mention for municipalities with a population of under 2,500.
