ANNUAL REPORT OF MEDICAL OFFIER OF HEALTH

"In general, we have once again been fortunate during the year in having very little infectious disease. The health of the community has been good.

As in past years, examination of new pupils was done at both grade schools and the program of immunization for all pupils was carried out against polio, diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus. Routine examination of various grades for skin disease, sore throat, vision defects, head lice, was done through the year at the school.

All school children were tuberculin tested and, when indicated, were given chest

X-rays.

Adults have been urged to protect themselves with polio vaccine and a great many have taken advantage of this free service.

There were only minor outbreaks of German Measles, Measles and Mumps, and one questionable case of Scarlet Fever in the town.

All schools were found to be in excellent

sanitary condition.

The two service stations were inspected and found to be satisfactory in regards to the sanitary conveniences available for their customers.

The lunch counter at the Recreation Centre was found to be in good sanitary condition and bacteria counts done on plates, glasses, and cutlery were excellent.

The North Camp dormitories, dining hall, kitchen and food storage are inspected weekly

and are satisfactory.

All water samples submitted form the town supply have been reported "A" by the Provincial Laboratory.

During 1959 there were sixty-two babies born in our bospital to Terrace Bay residents and a total of 146 births.

There was one adult death, one stillborn infant, and one death of a newborn infant."

TORONTO (CP) -- Bernard Nowman, a Liberal freshman in the legislature but an old pro in the sporting world, accused the Ontario Govt. Thursday last of keeping under wraps \$26,700

available for aid to amateur sport.

Mr. Newman, coach of internationally-known gymnast Ernestine Russell of Windsor and member for Windsor-Walkerville, said that despite the fact that he had been connected with sports for many years he had never heard of the money.

The money in aid of amateur sport is available from the office of the athletic commiss-

ioner in the labor department.

Labour Minister Laley said the office has been in existence for years and aided local sporting groups interested in forming such groups as little league teams. All sports were covered, from baseball to horseback riding. The money is used, he said, to provide such items as hockey sticks, baseballs and catchers and netminders! equipment.

Mr. Nowman said he had never heard of this aid before despite his close connection with sports and sporting organizations. "Why is this hidden from the public?" he asked.
