A letter from Counc. Evans-Smith to the Port Arthur Chamber of Commerce pointed out the omission of Terrace Bay from the itinerary in the new Lake Superior route and in a letter to Mr. Garland, District Engineer, he vehemently protested the deplorable condition of Highway 17.

An invitation to the 43rd Annual convention May 5 and 6 was received. Reimbursement was received from the Department of Highways for the strip of land adjacent to the highway.

Questioned about the proposed Safety Patrol, Council felt it should be referred to a Service Club to handle, together with the School Boards. A discussion on the Industrial Area adjacent to Terrace Bay found Council agreeing to forward the proposed plan to Toronto for perusal.

A meeting on Dog Control was called for Thursday, March 31, then the Council was adjourned.
