SAFETY ASSOCIATION MEETS IN TERRACE BAY

Kimberly-Clark Pulp and Paper Company of Terrace Bay played host to the Northwestern Branch of the Ontario Pulp and Paper Makers Safety Association on May 24th and 25th.

Delegates from Kenora, Fort Frances, Dryden, Fort William, Port Arthur, Red Rock and Marathon, representing all the Pulp & Paper Mills of Northwestern Ontario exchanged views and opinions on safety in the paper industry.

Invited to attend the meetings were representatives from the Department of Labour and the Ontario Manitoba Council of Pulp and Paper Mill Unions.

Bob Shirriff, mill manager at Terrace Bay, welcomed the group and introduced the delegates. Following the first day's meeting a banquet was held in the Hotel Terrace. Dr. Allen Townsend, staff psychologist for Kimberly-Clark at Neenah, Wisconsin was the guest speaker.

H. Whent, St. Lawrence Corporation, Red Rock, chaired the meeting. Reports and lectures were heard from D. Chant, secretary engineer of the association, reporting on the Ontario Pulp and Paper Maker's Safety Association; F.O. Soughton, training co-ordinator, Terrace Bay, on job training and safety; J. Chapman, industrial engineering superintendent, Terrace Bay, on industrial engineering safety; H. Roberts, trades supervisor, Terrace Bay, on what a supervisor expects of a safety program.

BASEBALL SEASON GETS UNDERWAY WITH ONE WIN AND ONE LOSS FOR COMETS

Last Thursday, the Baseball Club held a meeting to elect its first executive. Jack Thomas was elected President, Jim (Curly) Hale, Vice President, Murdo Campbell, Sec. Treasurer and Bill Louk, Finance. Plans were immediately started to open a successful season on Sunday when the Terrace Comets met Red Rock Paper Kings, last year's League Champs, in a double header.

The Terrace Bay Citizens' Band were out in force with rousing pre-game selections. The weather being dull and chilly was against the best showing of each team.

Red Rock won 5-0 in the first seven inning game while Terrace came back in the second contest with a 7-3 victory. LaSarge, one of the best hurlers in the league, was responsible for the Paper Kings' win while Carl Kolody equalled the feat for Terrace in the second. It would have been a real game had Kolody been against LaSarge as their statistics were very close. LaSarge struck out 15 and walked one against Kolody striking out 12 and walking four, each allowing only four hits.

The Comets weren't a starring team in the field or at the plate. Manager Thomas admits that they are weak at hitting but feels that he has capable boys on the mound and in the field; a few more practices will take out a lot of kinks. Wilkinson and Taylor pitched to Hanley in the first game with Kolody going the seven innings with Pytyck.

Red Rock used LaSarge for the seven innings of the first game but shuffled through three hurlers in the second.

There might be some kind of a record set by Ward. The first two times at bat he was hit on the first two pitches. He drew a walk on his third trip to the plate and was automatically called out when hit by a drive off the bat of Hanley when running from first to second.

Next game will be played here Thursday at 6 P.M. It will be Red Rock's home game.
