AGE LIMIT LOWERED FOR TRAINED HUNTERS

The Honourable J.W. Spooner, Ontario Minister of Lands and Forests, has announced that the present minimum age for the issue of a resident hunting licence will be lowered from sixteen years to fifteen years where the applicant for the licence can present a certificate that he has completed the hunter safety training course.

It has been the practice in the past to issue hunting licences to fifteen-year-olds which allowed them to hunt when accompanied by their parents. It is believed that the training given under the Hunter Safety Training Programme will provide younger boys with a sense of responsibility and a knowledge of safe handling of firearms and will minimize the risk of accidents among younger hunters.

In the many states and provinces in which hunter safety training programmes have been instituted, a similar reduction in age limit has been permitted for trained hunters.

At present, these regulations apply only to applicants for resident hunting licences.
