The prize for a fish caught by the youngest entrant was won by three-year old Debbie Burnside with a 3 lb. 2 oz. pickerel while nine-year old Christine Olsen was awarded the 'Smallest Fish' prize for her four ounce pike. Both girls are local residents.

A. Smith of Schreiber received a prize for the entry closest to two lbs while Arlene Osmar of Terrace Bay won the award for the largest fish caught by a lady with her 5 lb. 6 oz. pike.

For the smallest fish caught by a lady, Mrs. Gordon Dodge, Terrace Bay received a prize and Bill Hanley of the same town took honours for the first fish entered - a 3 lb. 4½ oz. speckled trout. The last fish entered award went to George Irwin of Marathon.

Other awards went to Arlene Osmar and H. Liebert of Terrace Bay for the fish closest to 5 lb. and 4 lb. respectively.
