NEW TOOL REPAIRS POWER SAW CHAIN IN LESS THAN FIVE MINUTES

A major advance in the power saw chain repair field has been accomplished with the invention of the Cannon Chain Breaker.

Through the use of this ingenious new repair tool, a cutter's down time can now be drastically reduced from long periods now experienced to a maximum of five minutes.

Designed by a former power saw user, this tool is capable of effecting fast, permanent chain repairs right on the wood cutter's strip. It will repair any type of power saw chain regardless of worn or misfiled chain condition.

No other tools or parts are required with the use of this tool. It incorporates all the necessary repair features for dismantling and re-assembling broken chain, including a river resizing chamber which permits the use of original chain rivets in effecting a repair.

Invented by Mr. Sherwood Cannon of Beardmore, Ontario, this product is the result of several years of experimenting and testing of various methods and appliances for achieving fast power saw chain repairs right in the woodlands and relieving the cutter of one of his most serious problems - down time due to broken chain!

The Cannon Chain Breaker is now available on the Canadian market with manufacturing headquarters at Toronto and a Port Arthur company have been appointed manufacturer's agents.

REHABILITATING LAKE TROUT FISHERIES IN LAKE SUPERIOR

The Minister of Lands and Forests, the Honourable J.W. Spooner has indicated that a close study is being made of the lake trout fisheries of Lake Superior at the present time since it is anticipated that regulation of the catch of lake trout by means of a quota may be necessary during the period of their rehabilitation.

With the control of the sea lamprey in Lake Superior apparently in sight, attention of the Great Lakes Fishery Commission and the various personnel concerned in the problem, is being directed toward the re-establishment of the lake trout in that lake. In the short time the lamprey has been present in numbers in Lake Superior, it has reduced the lake trout populations drastically. Recovery of these fish to a normal population level is bound to be very slow unless some means can be found to accelerate it. Two methods of achieving this are apparent, firstly, by the planting of lake trout yearlings to later augment the spawning population and secondly, by regulating the catches of lake trout during the critical part of the recovery period.

The restocking programme has been proceeding now for several years and will be continued. The States of Minnesota, Michigan and Wisconsin, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Ontario Department (Cont'd. P. 9)
