DUTIES OF A CONSERVATION OFFICER

The following article on Dept. of Lands & Forests Conservation Officers was received from the Terrace Bay Fish & Game Club.

The overall job of the Conservation Officer is Fish & Wildlife Management which includes Biology of the species; Nature of the habitat - i.e. environment; Population and harvest of fish and game; Regulations and law enforcement (It should be understood that enforcement is just a tool of management); Manipulation of habitat, i.e. lake poisoning; Manipulation of species, i.e. fish planting etc.; Co-operation with other services, i.e. forestry, clubs, etc.

The chief duties consist of -

1st. Gathering and applying facts pertaining to fish and wildlife.

2nd. Law enforcement, which could be stated as -

(a) Public education, i.e. interpreting facts, lectures, etc.

(b) Apprehension

(c) Removal of privileges, i.e. cancellation of licenses, etc.

One could safely say that law enforcement means bringing about the will of the people to carry out sound conservation plans.

KENORA HOCKEY TEAM COMMEMORATED

On August 24th, ceremonies in connection with the unveiling of an historical plaque commemorating the Kenora Thistles were held at Kenora. This plaque is one of a series being erected throughout the province by the Dept. of Travel and Publicity, acting on the advice of the Archaeological and Historic Sites Board of Ontario.

On January 7, 1907, the Kenora Thistles defeated a Brandon, Manitoba team and thus became champions of the Manitoba Hockey League. They then challenged the Montreal Wanderers for the Canadian championship. Playing at Montreal, the Thistles won the first game
