On September 22nd the Eleventh Annual Meeting of the Ontario Pulp & Paper Makers' Safety Association was held in the Prince Arthur Hotel, Port Arthur, Ontario.

## EMBS OF KIMBERLY-CLARK TERRACE BAY MILL INCREASE DAILY BENEFITS

At a meeting of the EMBS directors on September 23, revisions to clause 22 of the Society's By-Law were adopted. Daily benefits for each week day lost for a period not exceeding 26 weeks shall be paid at the following rates for sickness and accident:

Three dollars and fifty cents (\$3.50) for the first twenty-four (24) disability days. Seven dollars (\$7.00) the next twenty-four (24) disability days. Eight dollars and fifty cents (\$8.50) for any subsequent continuous disability days. This new clause incorporates two new important changes:-1. Sundays will be counted in establishing claims for sickness benefits. (No daily benefits will be paid for Sundays) 2. Daily benefits will be increased by \$1.50 (from \$7.00 to \$8.50) after a total of 48 disability days has elapsed. Full details of this liberalized clause should be obtained from the directors of the Society or may be secured from the bulletin board at the mill.
