HUNTER ACCIDENT REPORTS AGAIN POUR IN

Each year, at this season, reports are continually being filed on hunters inflicting injury on themselves and others. The following article was recently published by the Department of Lands and Forests.

"Hunter, make sure that what you're aiming at is game before you pull the trigger!

That's one of the cardinal commandments of safety in the hunting field emphasized in the Hunter Safety Training Programme sponsored by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests and actively supported by the Ontario Anglers and Hunters Federation and rod and gun clubs across the province. Since September 1st, ability to handle firearms safely is insisted upon before a hunting license is issued in Ontario. And yet accidents continue to happen.

Happily illustrating the gun safety doctrine are the following verses, author unknown, which first appeared in the Philadelphia Ledger in 1909:

A hunter popped a partridge on a hill,

While no reports have come to hand on the numbers enrolled in the various leagues this year we understand that all are once again underway. The Ladies Ten Pin League have seven teams this year and bowl on Thursday and Friday evenings in the Recreation Centre.

CONSULDER CARIBOU SEASON AS HERDS INCREASE

Estimating that there are now between 8,000 and 10,000 woodland caribou in Ontario, consideration is being given to opening a special hunting season for caribou next year, Ontario Lands and Forests Minister the Hon. J.W. Spooner states.

The animals are mostly concentrated north of the C.N.R. line running through Cochrane and Sioux Lookout.

It is felt that a carefully controlled hunt with a maximum permissible kill of 75 caribou would do no harm and would provide valuable information on the reproductive rate of the caribou in relation to the income rate for the Indians of the area. Long a source of meat and clothing for the Indian population the caribou decreased in numbers over a long period until just after the war. The last general open season was declared 27 years ago in 1933. Since then only treaty Indians who needed caribou for food have been permitted to kill them.
