

RECORD NUMBER OF CANADA SAVINGS BOND BUYERS

More Kimberly-Clarkers than ever before have taken advantage of the Payroll Savings Plan to buy Canada Savings Bonds. This year 313 employees, 19 more than the previous record and about 56% of our payroll, have signed up for bonds. This would seem to indicate that more people are coming to realize the advantages of this method of saving.
