In case you're interested the "mangle" was the forerunner of a wringer but this particular ponderous piece of machinery--hand operated--looks as if it really would mangle your delicate fabrics. The "Herald Range" was used in "Her Majesty Queen Alexandra's Technical School" and yet here and there are names we still see "Cross & Blackwell" and H.P. Sauce and, in a magazine advertisement Rudyard Kipling, Hall Cain, A. Conan Doyle, E.P. Oppenheim and others are listed as authors.

Many of the items Mrs. Beeton illustrates "What no good kitchen should be without" are unrecognizable to us--for instance "A Bottle Roasting Jack & Screen for same--and many of the recipes took hours to prepare. Garnishing and display of cookery seemed to be a major item too.

Sections of the book are devoted to French, German, Indian, etc. cookery and "now that we receive American Provisions in such good condition, it is as well we should know something about their Cookery. We give, therefore, some recipes for the cooking of those provisions with which we are already familiar, together with some purely American Dishes that as yet we have not had an opportunity of trying here, feeling sure that ere long means will be found to bring the required ingredients within our reach. "Amongst the plentiful supply of fresh provisions in America, fish takes a prominent place and forms a larger diet than here."
