"STOP, LOOK, LISTEN"

This is the slogan for March. Stop and Look at YOUR emergency fire escape doors. Every house in town has two, the back door which nine people out of ten use daily, and the front door. Does your front door open easily, or is it piled up with snow or stuck with ice?

I bring this to your attention because on driving around the streets in town I have noticed many doors which could not be opened if the occasion arose and they were needed. If a fire started in your kitchen or basement and your escape was cut off from the back door, could you use your front door if there

was, say two feet of, snow and ice in front of it? Or would you be caught inside of your smoke-filled house?

If a man in the mill sees a piece of machinery not working properly he draws it to the attention of his Superintendent or Foreman. The Superintendent or Foreman takes action and has it corrected or repaired before someone is injured or killed. I am drawing this to your attention so that you can have it corrected or repaired before someone in your family or yourself is injured or killed.

To Stop and Look could mean life or death to your family, just the same as a piece of machinery in the mill, if not repaired in time, could mean life or death to some workman. The mill motto is "Safety Pays". The Fire Department motto is "Fire Prevention" Stops Fires". So "Stop, Look, Listen", don't wait until it's too late.
