

JR. MATRIC. EXAMS TO START IN 1962

Beginning in 1962, all Grade 12 students in Ontario will be required to write final examinations, Education Deputy Minister C.W. Booth announced at the recent Ontario Educational Associ iation convention in Toronto.

Junior matriculation examinations had been part of Ontario's education system until they were dropped in 1940. They were re-introduced in Toronto

about five years ago, but elsewhere in the Province students who maintained high marks in a subject could be recommended without examination to Grade 13 in that course.

Mr. Booth said that the change in policy is aimed at setting for high school students a challenge which will better prepare them for Gr. 13 exams.
