

Since a plea to civic pride to keep our facilities safe and attractive from this and many other acts of petty vandalism seems to have no effect, we must take firmer steps.

A local "Ham" radio operator recently gave assistance in having a sick woman rushed to Port Arthur General Hospital by plane.

The distress call, issued by a missionary of the Northern Light Mission, 85 miles north of Red Lake, Ontario was first received by an operator at Norway Lake, Minn. This operator contacted the Terrace Bay resident who, with assistance from a Port Arthur operator, cleared the network to receive the distress signal and then phoned to the Lakehead for a plane to be dispatched to bring the ailing woman to the hospital. It is believed that the sick woman was a resident of the Indian reservation north of Red Lake.
