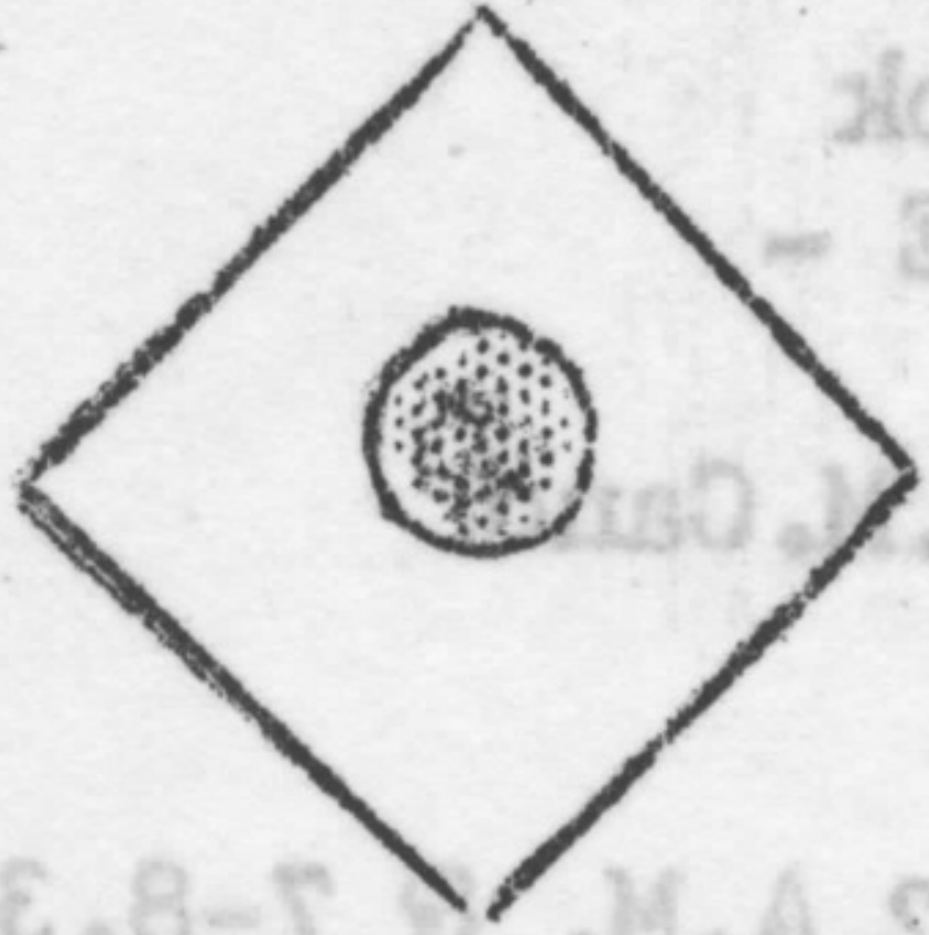

Attention of Terrace Bay residents is once again drawn to By-Law No. 27, Section 3 - governing regulations for the removal of garbage, etc.

"No greasy matter, decayed meat or any kitchen refuse shall be left exposed to flies at any time, but shall be placed in suitable Metallic cans provided with a fly-proof cover of same material, and deposited as above set out in order to give easy access to the garbage man."

A penalty is provided for any person convicted of a breach of any provision of this by-law.
