Asked if he had walked all the way he admitted accepting short lifts on gravel stretches in the Rockies where it was impossible to "push". The all Canada trip took him through Fraser Canyon and across Rogers Pass. The wheelbarrow holds camping equipment, provisions etc.

Having in mind reports on the last two month's prairie weather we asked for his reactions. Apparently the first rain on the trip was a thunderstorm encountered in the vicinity of Kenora. Temperature in Medicine Hat (in the shade) was 98 degrees and were consistently high through Saskatchewan and Manitoba. On this portion of the trip night walking was scheduled. He claims an average of some 34 miles per day and praises the hospitality extended to him enroute. Footgear is three pair of hand sewn mocassins, none of which showed signs of being ready for discard. He said he also was presented with a key to the City of Winnipeg and carries greetings from the Mayor of Winnipeg to Mayor Phillips of Toronto.

Married and the father of nine children (and unemployed before the trip), we asked if they were kept aware of his progress. He said that they are constantly receiving pictures snapped enroute and that newspapers are sending copies to his family when interviewed.

The wheelbarrow is equipped with ball-bearing wheels at the rear and on down hill stretches John jumps on and rides, somewhat after the manner of dog sled mushers who jump on the rear runners of the sleigh.

We can't vouch for the authenticity of all Mr. Pacaud's claims but, if he has walked all the way from Vancouver and does reach the C.N.E. at noon on its opening day we, who have grumbled over the prairie provinces' heat and narrow pass highways in the Rockies while riding in a comfortable auto, say we hope somebody re-imburses him for his efforts.

By the way, during the whole interview, we heard no word of complaint from John Pacaud about anything and last saw him, accompanied by a group of cheering youngsters, trundling down Highway 17 in brilliant sunshine, headed in the direction of Toronto.
