FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS - "HOME FIRE DRILL"

After many phone calls concerning our recent article in the Terrace Bay News about what to do if fire strikes and how to prevent fire from striking you, we of the Fire Dept. decided we would give the 9 steps in Home Fire Drill. The home fire drill should be talk and part action since there are many things a family should know about what they must do in case of fire.

Following the example of school fire drills the home fire drill should be handled seriously. It should not be made a game lest younger children get the idea fire is fun. The 9 steps of a home fire drill are:

1. Plan escape route and take family over it, all meet at a spot decided on in advance, e.g. sidewalk in front of house.
2. Warn family about dangers of smoke and suffocation.
3. Try the door test for fire and smoke.
4. Practice giving complete, accurate address of fire to guard station (Dial 3222 Fire Dept. Emergency number).
5. Point out danger points in home; stairways, drafty hallways.
6. Know your way out from upper floor.
7. Discuss the 3 types of fires and what puts them out.
8. Know what to do if you or your family catch fire.
9. Warn family about the 8 most serious fire threats to their safety.

These 9 steps will be given in full in future publications of the Terrace Bay News. Keep all copies for further reference.
