TERRACE BAY OBSERVES REMEMBRANCE DAY

Terrace Bay gathered round its Cenotaph Saturday, once more to honor the War dead, which, since Terrace Bay did not exist during any of Canada's wars, is a monument to honor persons buried elsewhere - a monument in honor of our patriotic dead.

Marching to the martial music of the Terrace Bay Band, Legionnaires of the Canadian Legion Branch 223 and veterans of Terrace Bay paraded to the Cenotaph where stood the Honor Guard under Warrant Officer 2 J. Clancy of the L.S.S.R. "Faith of Our Fathers" followed the singing of "O Canada" before the Very Rev. Dean E. A. Gallagher, addressed those assembled. Expounding the reasons for patriotism which in so many cases demanded the supreme sacrifice, Dean Gallagher said "Our patriotism must go into action in our daily life, and the first objective we must strive to take is the citadel of our own soul. It will capitulate to us if we are strong in virtue. We become strong in virtue by practicing virtue. Canada needs arms and ammunition. She needs tanks and planes and guns. But above all she needs nobler men and women, nobler fathers and mothers, nobler public officials and civil servants, nobler teachers, nobler employers and workers, nobler actors and entertainers, nobler people in every walk of life", and added that "those whose memory we commemorate today have set us an example of physical courage, but it is especially moral courage that we need in our day to day living. The principles upon which our democracy is based are derived from our heritage as Christians." Father Gallagher closed with the prayer that "Grant us who commemorate their death, the grace never to forget their sacrifice, and by our prayers and good works, unity and charity to all, carry on and achieve that ultimate victory over the enemies of mankind, that with real peace established on this earth, we may honor Thee more and more forever and ever Amen."

The Last Post was sounded by Mr. W. F. Colborne and, following the Two Minutes of silence, "Reveille". The gathering joined in singing "Nearer My God to Thee" before Dean

Gallagher pronounced the Benediction.

The Terrace Bay Band accompanied the march past of Legionnaires, Veterans and Honor Guard and was under the direction of Mr. H. Lohr.

A Remembrance Day Banquet was held Sat. evening in the Moose Hall with Mr. W.T. Baillie as Master of Ceremonies. Grace was pronounced by Rev. J. Ray Anderson and the Toast to the Queen by Dr. D.J.M. McCausland. Toast to the Fallen was reverently given by Mr. A. E. Hartman, and Last Post and Reveille were sounded by Mr. L. Kimmerer. Mr. H. Boudreau gave the toast to the ladies.

Two selections, "The Navy Hymn" and "God of Our Fathers" by the Terrace Bay Male Chorus under the direction of Mr. H. Lohr and accompanied by Mrs. S. Hodgkiss were well received before Mr. Baillie introduced the District Commander of the Canadian Legion, Mr. George Harris of Port Arthur. Mr. Harris in a few well chosen words, answered the questions "why the Legion" and were they "living in the past". "Many places" he remarked, "did not now hold a service of any kind to honor the dead. That is where the Legion comes in; for it is up to them to see that the public as a whole shall never be allowed to forget those of their Comrades who paid the supreme sacrifice. The Legion is an organization whose members know perhaps better than anyone else the true meaning of peace. Their voice is the councils of peace - and its necessary adjunct of military preparedness -- should be heard with deep respect." "Members of the Legion" he added, "help their brothers-in-arms and their families. They work with the disabled. The measures they have proposed to help the dependants of those who fought for freedom and all the Legion activities concerned with alleviating the personal problems and afflictions left by war, are meritorious". Mr. Harris was thanked by Mr. W. E. Cavanaugh for his excellent address.
