

**KIWANIS CONSERVATION PROGRAM**

A Mallard duck shot at Cochrane during the past hunting season had flown approximately 1,000 miles since the banding at Maryland January 5, 1961. From records established through the return of such bands, it has been established that these ducks have been known to live more than 20 years. Extreme ages of 26 years have been known for the Caspian tern and up to 21 years for the ring-billed gulls and sople. Among similar land birds, purple martins and bluejays have been known to reach 14 years.

Birds banded in North America have been recovered as far away as Siberia, Africa, France and the mid-Pacific islands. The pin-tail is famous as a traveller and they have been recovered in South America; Japan, Siberia and New Zealand. One was recovered in England only 18 days after banding on this continent.

Over 11,000,000 have been banded and a half a million are added each year. About a million banded birds have been recovered, providing information as to migration routes, wintering and breeding grounds, mortality, etc., valuable in wild fowl management.

Local sportsmen and others finding banded birds are asked to make sure they send all bands to the address designated on the band.
