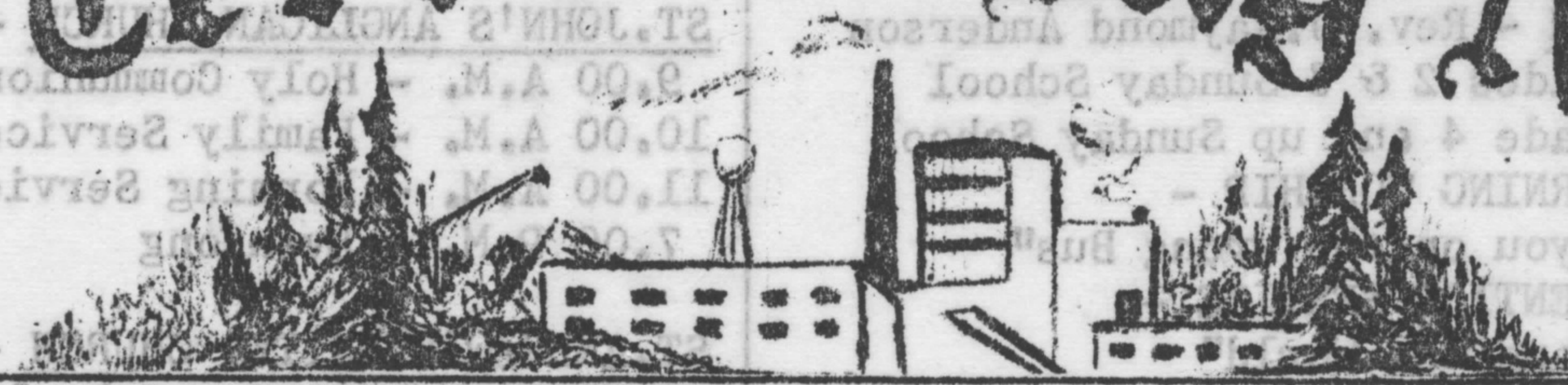

OPTIMISM KEYNOTE OF SAFETY MEETING

Safety men representing the ten member mills of this area composing the Northwestern Branch of the Ontario Pulp and Paper Makers' Safety Association reported a very happy and encouraging fact; a substantial reduction in industrial injuries for the Association as a whole, the Branch and eight out of the ten member mills during 1961.

In welcoming the delegates, Mr. Claude Steeves, Mill Manager of the host Company, the Marathon Corporation of Canada Limited, remarked on this reduction and, in extending congratulations on this achievement, also put a challenge to all those present to further reduce injuries in 1962. This challenge was quickly accepted by the delegates present, who felt that the value of Safety was having an increasing and enveloping circle of acceptance and that Safety-Efficiency was now synonymous for work-method throughout the Pulp and Paper Industry.

Mr. Owen Hanson, Vice President and General Manager of the Marathon Corporation of Canada Limited, guest speaker at the banquet tendered the delegates, spoke inspiringly and encouragingly, pointing out that, in addition to the most important aspect of Safety, which was the saving of life and limb of individuals, or in other words, the human factor, the economic factor was also of great importance to the individual, to the industry and the country as a whole.

Mr. Doug Chant of the Ontario Pulp and Paper Makers' Safety Association, Toronto, presented a framed certificate of achievement to the St. Lawrence Corporation, Red Rock, for winning the 1961 Branch contest. Dick Whent accepted it on behalf of all St. Lawrence personnel, Management and Union, who he gave credit to for winning it.

The Great Lakes Paper Company were congratulated by Mr. Chant for having the greatest percentage improvement of any member mill.

Mr. Chant also presented Oscar Talarico of the Marathon Corporation with a membership in the Beaver Club, an honorary award earned by Oscar for having saved himself from suffering serious eye injuries by wearing protective safety goggles.

A very interesting and informative talk was presented by Dr. C. H. J. Reason of Marathon on the "Medical Aspects of Accident Prevention."

Messrs. John deBelle and Don Ballantyne of C.I.L., Montreal, gave a constructive presentation on Chemical Hazards and also showed a film dealing with the importance of safety to mounting climbing, relating this importance to everyday work practices.
