Evans-Smith, Valiquette and Fraser suggested many alternatives of payment but the original proposal remained the most likely to be acceptable.

The Municipality would, Reeve Heenan explained, purchase this year the land outlined as a Trailer Park. This minus the pool, could be roughed out for a trailer park this summer and various organizations within the town who had volunteered assistance could go ahead on this as a project, with further assistance possible in the future.

By-Law No. 144 was passed by Council to provide for the establishment and development of an approved park at Terrace Bay. A resolution authorized the sale of \$20,000. Hydro Electric Power Commission Bonds through the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, Public Library, Hydro Electric current and capital accounts and Township accounts were read by Secretary F. Strutt and approved by Council for payment.

Mr. Oren Mason was appointed to fill the vacancy on the High School Board, effective immediately.

Fire report for the month of February listed a very quiet month with just one service call. The First Aid course for the Department under the St. John Ambulance was now over, with the exception of the exams. Assistance had been given to Schreiber during the month for the Hotel fire. Fire Chief Hofland further reported on the testing of fire nozzles for the booster line by the Department.

A sharp decline during the month of February was the statistical report shown from Chief Constable H. Billings, twenty-two cases being investigated, and no major crime for the month.

DISTRICT COURT HELD

In District Magistrates Court on Tuesday March 20th, two men appeared before Magistrate T. A. Connor, one pleading guilty to charges of impaired driving and one pleading not guilty to a charge of having care and control of a motor vehicle, while impaired by alcohol. Both men were found guilty and sentenced to fines of \$150.00 each plus court costs and both had their driver's licenses suspended for a period of three months.
