### CHAMBER OF COMMERCE RECOMMENDS EXTENSION OF PARKING AREA ON SIMCOE PLAZA

Council members, C.E. Paget (Chairman), M.L. Houston, L. Waghorn, K. MacLeod, E. Stobart and I. Marsh met in the Recreation Centre on Saturday morning. N. Cornthwaite of the Terrace Bay Motor Hotel also attended.

Minutes of a previous meeting were adopted and a lengthy correspondence file dealt with. The resignation of R. Hofland was accepted with regret and Earl Stobart appointed in his place. Letters from visitors to the Charter night celebration indicated their appreciation of the hospitality extended, a communication for a Survival Course to be conducted at Quetico Park this summer was endorsed and several letters from the National Chambers of Commerce were read.

Council will take the recommended action re the Royal Commission on Health Services and consideration was given to Policy Changes and Amendments - Productivity Councils - Paint-up, Clean-up Month (May) and booklets outlining the duties of Council officers and committee chairmen were ordered.

### COUNCIL QUOTES

Council met on Wednesday in the Municipal Offices with Reeve J.P. Heenan presiding. Councillors attending were J. Wellings, D. Evans-Smith, A. Valiquette and A. Fraser with Secretary F. Strutt and Assistant W. Hanly.

Correspondence included affirmation of support by Douglas Fisher, M.P. in the Town's efforts to have C.B.C. establish a low power transmitter unit in the town. The application of the Terrace Bay Hydro system to revise its rates had been approved and the new rates would commence in April for Commercial and May (including April) for residential.

A request from Kimberly-Clark urging an effective spring cleanup included landscaping and completion of property in the new division.

A letter commending Mr. R.J. Slattery had been sent by Council commending him for organizing help so promptly, no doubt saving the life of a boy adrift on Lake Superior.

Mr. Oren Mason was notified of his appointment to the High School Board as Town Council representative. The Library Board recommendation to purchase new books instead of increasing Bookmobile service was ratified - according to their needs and budget.

Councillor Fraser stated the School Nurse was in North Bay where she would make inquiries about School nurses in that City. He also stated the Mobile Health Unit would cover from Nipigon to Marathon.

Councillor Valiquette requested a further sum for the Schreiber Transient Fund and this was passed. He conveyed Constable Billings inquiry re street lights in the South Camp Area and was informed by Councillor Wellings that the whole area was going to be revamped.

Reeve Heenan suggested a meeting with the Police and Fire Committees for purpose of establishing a satisfactory Police relief system.

Complaints regarding dogs at large resulted in Council notifying the dog-catcher to commence his services for the Season.

Councillors noted many of the comments on the proposed Town Swimming Pool. Quoting figures on tourists visiting Rainbow Falls, Councillor Evans-Smith felt development of the Trailer Park and Pool would receive considerably more aid, and possibly a heated pool in town could be built at a later date. Reeve Heenan remarked many were concerned about the cleanliness of that pool though it had passed inspection last year. He was of the opinion that those whom they represent, the taxpayer, wanted a swimming (Cont'd P.10)
