RE FISHING LICENSES (Dept. of Lands & Forests)

Geraldton Office:- This office has had a few enquiries from Manitoba residents concerning angling privileges for 1962. A resident of Manitoba or Saskatchewan, who furnishes proof of residence in either province, will not require a license to angle in Ontario. Residents of provinces other than Manitoba and Saskatchewan will however require non-resident angling licences.

Restocking of speckled trout waters commenced on May 28th in the District. Thirty-five thousand speckled trout fingerlings have been air-dropped to date and it is hoped this phase of our fisheries management program will be completed within the next week or ten days.
