the former grounds have been bulldozed. He also reported that improper garbage containers are used by some householders and that garbage is carelessly parcelled. It was decided to wait two weeks and, if the condition is not remedied, notice will sent to offenders, following which action will be taken.

The MOH reported 18-20 water tests taken since Jan.1st and found in proper condition but inspection of Spring at Walker Lake showed it in unsatisfactory condition. Dairies have been inspected and approved: local septic tanks and cesspools appear fairly well taken care of. Mr. Borutski was given dye to put in cesspools and septic tanks to reveal seepage. The condition is suspected in west end of Town where an overflow into ravine could occur.

Dr. Cornell stated community health is estimated fairly good and two-thirds of the town took the TB skin test. TB contacts will be checked shortly and an X-ray clinic is being arranged for October.
